Georgia Public Library Trustee Special Meeting Thursday, November 3rd, 2022, 6:00 pm Location: Georgia Public Library <u>MINUTES - APPROVED</u>

Attendance: Ben Ebert, Sara Walker (via call-in), Bob Giroux, Cindy Rutkowski, Bridget Stone

- 1. Call to order: 6:03
- 2. Discussion of Budget
 - a. Bob and Bridget gave a recap of the 10/27/22 budget meeting with the Selectboard.
 - b. During budget meeting, Gary Wright mentioned the possibility of, the town office switching buildings with Georgia Public Library.
 - i. GPL Board is unsure if this comment was off the cuff or an actual intention.
 - c. Losing our building means missing out on multiple large grant opportunities, potentially totaling \$500,000.
 - d. Action Item: GPL Board will send a memo to the Selectboard stating our concerns, listing grants and opportunities that would be missed without assurance regarding the continuation of Georgia Public Library in it's current location.
 - i. Ben will draft this letter.
 - e. We need a Friends group now more than ever. Discussion regarding crucial need for community support.
 - i. Action Item: start by collecting feedback from the community via a survey.
 - f. Discussion regarding requisite need for a joint meeting with selectboard, or time on Selectboard agenda. What are impediments preventing this
 - i. Extreme frustration regarding the lack of good communication and continuing issues around library staff pay, sick/vacation time, etc.
 - g. Budget proposal: Zero Base Budgeting. Persistent lack of clarity regarding this complex request. Noted that organizations usually have extensive training before embarking on this process.
 - i. We must have more staff hours in our budget.
- 3. Moving our regular monthly meeting from November 14th to November 17th so that Ben and Bob can attend the Selectboard meeting on November 14th
- 4. Executive Session, if necessary: A public body may only enter into executive session upon a majority vote on a motion made in an open meeting that indicates the reason for going into executive session.¹

¹ The only permissible reasons for going into executive session are set forth in 1 V.S.A. § 313. One category, requires the public body to make a specific finding that "premature general public knowledge would clearly place the public body or a person involved at a substantial disadvantage" prior to considering one of the following in executive session: contracts; labor relations agreements with employees; arbitration or mediation; grievances, other than tax grievances; pending or probable civil litigation or a prosecution, to which the public body is or may be a party; or confidential attorney-client communications made for the purpose of providing professional legal services to the body. Other things a public body may consider in executive session are: The negotiating or securing of real estate purchase or lease options; The appointment or employment or evaluation of a public officer or employee, provided that the public body makes its final decision to hire or appoint a public officer or employee in an open meeting and must explain the reasons for its final decision during the open meeting; A disciplinary or dismissal action against a public officer or employee; but nothing in this subsection shall be construed to impair the right of such officer or employee to a public hearing if formal

charges are brought; A clear and imminent peril to the public safety; Discussion or consideration of records or documents that are not public documents under the access to public records act.
